THE CHANGING FACE OF AFRICA

Dr. George H. T. Kimble, Director of the American Geographical Society in New York City, at his young age is already considered one of the world's leading geographers. Born in London 1908, he received his Bachelor's, Master's, and A. K. C. degree in England before receiving his Ph.D. (summa cum laude) in Geography from the University of Montreal. He is a Fellow and Member of many learned societies, has travelled widely throughout the world including a trip around the world in 1944, and has issued several publications. He has kindly consented to attend our meeting and tell us of his recent travels and work in Africa. This second largest continent of over eleven and a half million square miles has a population now of over 175 million people. It is a land of trusteeships, free territories, the British, French, Spanish, Belgian, and Portuguese. It is world famous for the highest temperature ever recorded, 136°F. September 13, 1922, the largest desert, Sahara 3,000,000 square miles, the longest river, Nile 4,000 miles, second highest waterfall, Tugela 2800 feet, and the second longest canal, Suez 103 miles. It produces 98% of the world's output of diamonds and contains some of the world's greatest big-game hunting areas.
