**ENIGMAS OF THE SOUTHERN OCEAN: THE NON-EXISTENT ISLANDS
WITH ERNEST SHACKLETON'S EXPLORATIONS**

OF THE MANY fascinating obscurities of the frigid oceans are the assortment of small isolated islands charted throughout them. In the south the Peri-Antarctic islands are well known; indeed, Shackleton termed one of the largest, South Georgia, the *Gateway to the Antarctic*. However, a similar number of other islands, now known to be non-existent, have also appeared on charts. Expeditions, sealers and whalers all reported many such islands. This evening we will learn of these: their 'discovery,' investigation, and ultimate expungement. One of the various objects of Shackleton's several expeditions was the investigation of their existence.

Our speaker at this historic meeting of the Harvard Travellers Club will give us an account of his long years of research on this interesting subject and some of the surprising conclusions. In the centenary of Shackleton's death at the Antarctic gateway the lecture will conclude with news of the latest developments in the story of his explorations.

Robert K. Headland was for many years the Archivist and Curator at SCOTT POLAR RESEARCH INSTITUTE at the University of Cambridge, the world's premier polar research center. He continues as a Senior Institute Associate, his main field of interest being historical geography. He's a member of both the Arctic Club and the Antarctic Club (UK) and has been decorated with the Polar Medal (1984).

Previous to his time at SPRI he worked for BAS, the British Antarctic Survey. While at BAS he was stationed on South Georgia and was held captive there by invading Argentine forces during the Falklands War. He has travelled extensively in both north and south polar regions and elsewhere. He's considered by many as the world's leading expert on both polar regions.

He is the author of several well-regarded books including *A Chronology of Antarctic Exploration* (Quaritch, 2009) and *The Island of South Georgia* (Cambridge University Press, 1984), and many papers on the geography and history of these regions.



THIS evening the Harvard Travellers Club holds its 900th meeting. The Club's first meeting was held on Saturday, November 15, 1902, in the Harvard Union on the corner of Quincy and Harvard Streets. An invitation had gone out to Harvard men and others interested in considering "...the formation of a Harvard Travellers Club, with the object of promoting intelligent travel and exploration." The invitation was signed by Professor William Morris Davis, Archibald Cary Coolidge, Copley Amory, James H. Kidder and Roland B. Dixon. Thirty men in all—students, alumni and professors—showed up. Of these thirty, the mix was close to even between students (graduate and undergraduate—12), Harvard academics (10) and others (alumni—8).

At first, the Club's meetings were only talks, perhaps with light refreshments before or after. The Union and on several occasions the Fogg Art Museum were used for meetings, also the private houses of members (on 22 occasions). Clubs were also used, particularly the University Club (23 meetings) when it was on Beacon Street and the Boston Athletic Association (8 meetings), then on the present site of the Boston Public Library addition. Between 1931 and 1949, the Club held 13 meetings at the Institute of Geographical Exploration at 2 Divinity Avenue in Cambridge. The Club also had its office and library in this building which was built by Club member A. Hamilton Rice. But without question the Club's most frequent venue has been here at the Harvard Club of Boston. The first meeting at 374 Commonwealth Avenue was on November 28, 1913, 16 days after the building's dedication. The Club has met here 772 times since, interrupted only by 13 meetings held remotely via Zoom in 2020-2022 due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Club meetings only began to be numbered starting with the 415th meeting (October 10, 1961). In actual fact there have been more than 900. At least 56 other non-regular gatherings of the Club have been held, ranging from meetings of the Fellows to "Practical Talks" about a variety of travel topics to Exhibitions that were open to the general public to special luncheons or dinners (ones were given to Roald Amundsen, Sir Ernest Shackleton and Norman Vaughan, coincidentally all polar explorers). Glover Allen, who authored the *History of The Harvard Travellers Club 1902–1932*, was the one who going through the Club archives numbered the meetings through the 208th, May 13, 1932, the end period of his History.

At these 900 meetings, talks have been given by 1,146 persons. Some evenings in the early years of the Club would feature three speakers. In 1993 once-a-year Club or Members Nights were introduced sometimes

resulting in as many as seven speakers. For those talks that are easily classified as to geographical area, Asia is far and away the leader at 27%, followed by Africa (14%), The Pacific, South America, Europe and the United States (each 8%), Canada and the Arctic (each 7%), Central America and the Middle East (each 4%), The Antarctic (3%), and The Caribbean, Australia and Space (each 1%).

With respect to subject matter, mountaineering historically has been the most often presented, but in recent years this is less so. The world has become more complicated, and this is reflected in the topics at the meetings. Indeed, fully 16 of the 50 most recent talks have been on topics related to world-spanning adventures or important worldwide issues such as climate and the environment.

Who has spoken to the Club the most times? Our member of longest standing, joining in 1931, Club Medalist H. Bradford Washburn, Jr. He's spoken on 16 occasions, the first on December 3, 1929, when he spoke on *The Ascent of the Grépon*, and most recently (with David Roberts and Robert Bates) at the 748th meeting on March 11, 2003, when the subject was *Escape from Lucania*.

There have been many memorable meetings and speakers over the years. There have been the anniversary meetings, more frequent in recent years than in the past. Perhaps the early members thought the Club might not last too long. The first that seems to have been recorded was the 50th Anniversary, held on November 16, 1952 (Meeting 344). George H. T. Kimble spoke on the *The Changing Face of Central Africa*. Then, on the 21st of March, 1972, the 500th Meeting was held. A hundred meetings later, on November 13, 1984, Kermit and Jonathan Roosevelt were the featured speakers. The 650th was on January 15, 1991, and featured Rob Perkins and Chris Knight speaking on *Kamchatka: The Unknown*

Land. Tweed Roosevelt recounted his *Return from the River of Doubt: The 1992 Rio Roosevelt Expedition* at the 90th Anniversary meeting on November 10, 1993. On March 11, 1997, the 700th Meeting was held, H. Bradford Washburn, Jr., speaking on the *Matterhorn, McKinley and Everest*. On November 15th of 2002 we celebrated our 100th Anniversary, our 744th Meeting, with our speaker Jonathan Shackleton, the third Shackleton to address the Club. At the 750th Meeting, on the 27th of May 2003, Astronaut Story Musgrave was the speaker. The 800th meeting took place on November 10, 2009, with mountaineer Conrad Anker, whose talk was entitled *The Shark's Fin*. Our 850th meeting, held on January 12, 2015, featured Wendy Brooker as our speaker; her talk: *90 Degrees Latitude and Longitude...Incredible!* And tonight we celebrate the 900th meeting with Robert K. Headland speaking on *Enigmas of the Southern Ocean: The Non-Existent Islands, with Ernest Shackleton's Explorations*.

Anniversary meetings sometimes coincided with appearances of famous speakers. A Harvard Travellers Club Meeting Timeline

November 15, 1902 – First meeting of the Harvard Travellers Club at the Harvard Union.

January 16, 1903 – First recorded instance of food being served. Second meeting of the Club. "A light supper will be served at 9.30."

January 29, 1904 – First dinner before a meeting. Harvard Union. Price \$2. Attended by 23.

March 25, 1904 – First meeting held in a private home, the house of George B. Dorr, 18 Commonwealth Avenue, Boston.

May 18, 1905 – Probably the first Annual meeting as such; held at residence of Dr. John L. Bremer, 416 Beacon Street, Boston.

April 27, 1906 – First showing of motion pictures at a Club meeting, at the house of Mr. Edwin H. Abbot, 1 Follen Street, Cambridge.

February 14, 1908 – First Annual Dinner Meeting. Held at the Hotel Brunswick, Boston.

March 18, 1908 – Exhibition Meeting at Horticultural Hall. First attendance of a Club event by women.

May 7, 1909 – Probably first Ladies' Night. Held at Horticultural Hall. 200 present.

December 12, 1911 – Col. Theodore Roosevelt speaks at Meeting 72 held at the Exchange Club, Boston.

January 17, 1913 – President Charles W. Eliot speaks on *The Social and Political Condition of China*.

November 28, 1913 – First meeting held at the newly opened Harvard Club. Professor Roland B. Dixon, *Twelve Hundred Miles through the Northern Himalayas*.

December 13, 1938 – First showing of color motion pictures at a Club meeting. December 13, 1938.

January 16, 1940 – First woman speaker. "She is the only woman to have addressed the Club in the thirty-eight years of its existence, and signally deserves that honor." Mrs. Laura Bolton, *Africa in Sound and Film*. This was also the first showing of sound motion pictures at a Club meeting.

February 25, 1947 – 300th Meeting. Held at the Institute of Geographical Exploration. William P. House, "Exercise Musk-Ox" *3100 Miles through Northern Canada in 1946*.

November 16, 1952 – 50th Anniversary Meeting. George H. T. Kimble, *The Changing Face of Central Africa*.

October 10, 1961 – First meeting to have the meeting number on the meeting notice. Number 415.

March 21, 1972 – 500th Meeting. Sidney N. Shurcliff, *Taiwan*.

February 20, 1973 – "A loud speaker public address amplifier was used with considerable success." First such use.

October 6, 1976 – Only known instance of a speaker not appearing. Eugenie Clark failed to show because of weather and two members each of the Harvard Travellers Club and the Women's Travel Club spoke without slides. Precursor to Members Night.

January 11, 1977 – First African-Americans to speak to Club, S. Allen Counter, Jr. and David L. Evans, *Surinam's Ex-Slaves: African Settlements in America*.

January 11, 1977 – Nametags first instituted at meetings.

November 13, 1984 – 600th Meeting. Kermit and Jonathan Roosevelt, *East Africa: A Roosevelt Retrospective*.

January 15, 1991 – 650th Meeting. Robert F. Perkins,

Jr. and Chris Knight, *Kamchatka: The Unknown Land*.

November 10, 1992 – 90th Anniversary Meeting. Tweed Roosevelt, *Return from the River of Doubt: The 1992 Rio Roosevelt Expedition*.

February 9, 1993 – Club (later Members) Night first held. Meeting 667.

October 10, 1995 – Club starts using its own slide projector.
